In the 1950s a group of painters, poets, and filmmakers articulated their dissatisfaction with mainstream society through works of art with a distinctly West Coast sensibility. Fueled by Asian metaphysics, the industry of Hollywood, and the physicality of the landscape, the work of these artists was characterized by a sense of freedom and openness and a pronounced disregard for the formal traditions of art as it was produced in places like New York City. Avant-garde cinema played a particularly vital role in helping to define what came to be known as the "Beat" movement, with artists and filmmakers in Southern California enjoying a fruitful dialogue with their colleagues in the Bay Area. Beat became a pseudonym for a certain state of mind rather than a reference to an actual time and place, or a specific film or painting.
