ANNUAL GALA CHRISTMAS SHOW: CHICAGO PREMIERE OF LARRY JORDAN'S FULL-LENGTH ANIMATED FEATURE/SOPHIE'S PLACE

Greetings of the season! Hard on the smash success of last month's "Sexual Inclination/Two" program — for which we owe profuse thanks to you, our loyal audience — we return this month with a really fun show (in three parts) to enliven the holiday season. First: the great "long version" (20 minutes) of Kenneth Anger's poem to unrequited love, RABBIT'S MOON, with a witty soundtrack consisting of several of the most original and haunting love—songs of classic Fifties rock. During his visit to Chicago a year ago, Anger said that this version is the one he considers definitive rather than the short (6 minutes) "kiddie version" he released later, and we urged him to put both versions in distribution. Anger promised to consider doing that, but meanwhile we discovered, hidden away in the pages of the huge tome that is the Museum of Modern Art film catalog, one last print of the original, full-length version of RABBIT'S MOON, which we promptly scheduled for this end-of-year celebration.

Second: a "mini-fest" of shorts from Charlie Chaplin's incredibly creative first year of filmmaking (1914) with Mack Sennett at Keystone, including KID AUTO RACES AT VENICE, a very brief, rather crude improvisation which was only the second (possibly third) film Chaplin made, after he had been before the camera, at most, a couple of weeks! Yet in this tiny gem Chaplin was inspired to invent, nearly full-blown, the character who became known throughout the world as the Little Tramp, and who was to be his public persona in scores of films over the next twenty-plus years, through the making of MODERN TIMES in 1936.

And our feature: SOPHIE'S PLACE by master San Francisco animator Larry Jordan, a prolific filmmaker who has mastered many styles but who is best known for his lovely, lyric, collage-style animations based on 19th century engravings. Larry Jordan's earlier films in this style include his celebrated classic from the Sixties, OUR LADY OF THE SPHERE, and the delightful MASQUERADE and MOONLIGHT SONATA, shown on earlier programs in this series. (We've also shown three other Larry Jordan films, examples of his "live-action/documentary" style: CORNELL/1965, VISIONS OF A CITY, and MAGENTA GERYON.) Jordan has made one prior, extended-length animation, a marvellous illustration of Samuel Taylor Coleridge's poem, read by Orson Welles, RIME OF THE ANCIENT MARINER. But SOPHIE'S PLACE, far exceeding in ambition any of his previous works in this style, is the film that Larry Jordan considers his "first fully animated feature." ROBERT FRANK/LIFE DANCES ON...
DOUG HAYNES/COMMON LOSS

Robert Frank, one of the greatest living still photographers ("The Americans"), abandoned photography in 1958 to devote his life to film (and recently, video) making. His first film, PULL MY DAISY, became a classic, the one great document that exists of the Beat era, but later work has rarely been seen, for many and complex reasons. LIFE DANCES ON... from the early Eighties, one of Frank's most recent personal films will be a "warmup" to the coming release of CANDY MOUNTAIN, co-directed by Rudy Wurlitzer. Haynes's COMMON LOSS, great animation discovery!
